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Phoenix Sky Harbor Airport Museum



The Recycle Runway Collection is currently on exhibit at the **Phoenix Sky Harbor Airport in Terminal 3, on Level 2.** It will be on display through September 2010. The exhibition tagline is: "Waste does not exist, only wasted resources."

The intent of the exhibition is to raise public awareness about environmental concerns and what each of us can do to address these issues. Each of the fourteen unique fashions was created with a specific eco-message.

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The Jellyfish Dress



The Jellyfish Dress is currently on loan to the Art in Public Places Program of New Mexico Arts, Department of Cultural Affairs. It is displayed in the New Mexico State Bataan Memorial Building on 300 Galisteo St. across from the NM State Capital. This winter, it will join the Recycle Runway Collection in the Hartsfield-Jackson Atlanta International Airport.

The Jellyfish Dress was created partially in public workshops in Lincoln City, on the Oregon Coast. Nancy Judd spent many childhood weekends on these beaches, which instilled in her a reverence for nature that has inspired her life-long passion for environmental education.

The newest Recycle Runway garment, the Jellyfish Dress, was created this summer from used plastic bags. The aquatic looking skirt is made from ironing green dry cleaning bags with blue newspaper bags. The necklace, bodice, skirt and the tentacles are made from white grocery bags.

The goal of the Jellyfish Dress is to bring awareness to the tragic effects of litter on marine life. Seabirds, sea turtles, fish, and marine mammals often ingest trash that they mistake for food. Sea turtles have been found to swallow plastic bags because they look like jellyfish, one of their favorite foods. Ingesting this debris can seriously harm marine life. Three of the top five types of marine litter are recyclable: plastic bottles, plastic bags, and cans. (Environmental Protection Agency)

Nancy Judd has given twenty three presentations and hands-on workshops so far this year. They are an important way for her to share her environmental message directly with youth and adults. Some workshop participants created their own recycled fashions. Others made beads from magazines, and candle holders from old glass jars and catalogues. Several participants even helped Ms. Judd construct new Recycle Runway fashions.
